FROM THE PRESIDENT'S DESK

What good news we received last week.

Nancy Reiser's brother has gifted us with a baby grand piano! To top it off, Ginny has found a home for the piano – The Music School in Providence – where it will be placed in their concert hall, tuned, played and cared for before coming home to us when our Parish House is completed. How lucky we are. Thank you very much.



The Board has been tackling the many issues surrounding worship and church school during a year when we have no Parish House. It is becoming clearer to us that it may be difficult to use the Parsonage for office space and church school classrooms for a multitude of reasons – inaccessibility and fire code topping the list. And of course, we would also lose the rental revenue. While we can rent an office trailer for use by Judy and Rev Barbara at fairly reasonable rates, and we will be renting a storage trailer, it becomes cost prohibitive to rent a trailer for use as a classroom. **Can you help us scout out possibilities?** We are looking for a small committee – no more than 2 or 3 – who have some free time during regular work hours to investigate rental possibilities in East Greenwich and the surrounding communities. Please call me to discuss. I would like to set up a meeting asap to share our work so far and to offer suggestions.

You are our best eyes and ears. Our congregation travels from many surrounding communities, so look around – what's in your neighborhood? Are there any empty buildings that might be rented for Sunday use at a nominal fee? Is there space that is used during the week but that might be available on Sundays? Can you inquire? Call me evenings at home.

Very soon you will have an opportunity to view the new church house designs on our website. We'll let you know as soon as they are posted.

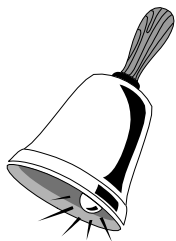


I had to be here. I like helping

HELPING HANDS by TEAH MARKSTONE: On Sunday, Teah set up a display with balloons. Here is what she did and why:

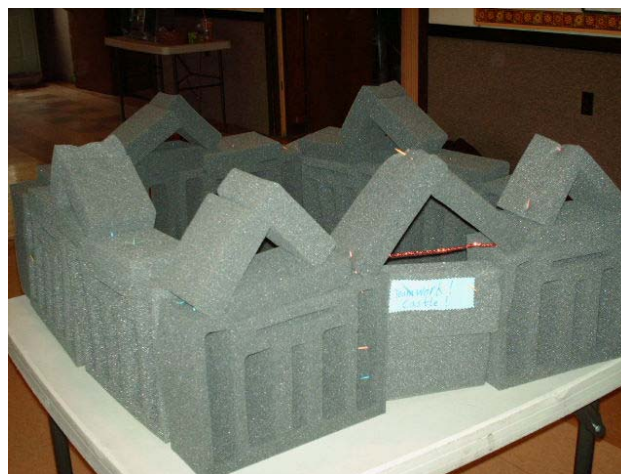

THE BOOKS OF WISDOM: PROVERBS, SONG OF SOLOMON AND JOB

3rd Wednesday of the month - February 17, March 17, April 21 and May 19; 6:30-8:30 p.m.

Join **Rev. Barbara Fast** and facilitator **Cindy Reiser** for this workshop. It will be some education, some contemplation, and some sharing in order to hear what, if any, wisdom these texts may contain for each of us. If you have a Bible, please bring it.

Dear Friends and Families of Westminster:

Two weeks ago, several children were playing in the Sun Room of the church house and the playing got a little out of hand. During this play, there were displays of disrespectful behavior, physical violence, and bullying. There is Zero Tolerance in our RE Program for physical violence and bullying.

On Sunday, Nathan DeSisto and I met with the four children involved in this incident. The details of what happened were not what Nathan and I were seeking to explore with them; rather, we were seeking to process with them why their actions did not reflect the values we hold so dearly in our community. (Parents: Perhaps when you discuss this with your child(ren), you may remind them too that “who did what and to whom” is not the talking point, but rather “what happened” and “what should have happened” is what we are aiming for.)

Nathan and I spent time inviting each child to speak using “I” statements. While each child took turns speaking, the rest of us listened. After some time reflecting, the children were able to begin the process of connecting with how they were feeling during the incident and even began to discern why they behaved the way they did. It was amazing to watch them and listen to them process what happened.

It was noted that two of the children had gone to their parents (loving, involved, and engaged parents), but neither parent left the coffee hour to address what was happening. I too was present when one of the children reported getting hurt and dismissed it as “kids playing too rough.”

It wasn't until later that we all realized there had been much more to what was happening and that things had really gotten out of hand. The children themselves admitted to not realizing how out of control things had become, nor did they realize that when someone says STOP! that it really does mean STOP!

Towards the end of our discussion on Sunday, not only did they apologize to one another in a meaningful and respectful way, but together they came up with a covenant for how children AND adults should behave during coffee hour. I would like to share with everyone what they found most important:

Think before you speak.
Don't assume what someone else is thinking or feeling.
Speak respectfully. Play respectfully.
Tell a grown-up when someone is not being respectful.
Expect grown-ups to help.

Our mission states that we seek to provide a sacred and safe space for our community. If we are to do that, we must ensure that everyone who comes here feels valued, safe, and secure.

It is my hope that parents will discuss this with their children, adults will answer the call for help, and everyone will help to carry out our mission of providing a sacred and safe space for all members of our community.

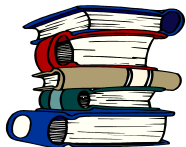

This year the International Institute has the challenge of serving more refugees than ever before. In the months between June, the start of their new fiscal year, and October, 2009, more refugees arrived than had been expected for the entire year. Now, even more are expected. These people need help in starting a new life in the US.

Since 2007, we, at Westminster Unitarian Church, have been helping refugees by donating household goods such as bedding, towels, kitchenware, and both personal hygiene and household supplies.

PROVIDENCE SINGERS

Mozart *Requiem*
Britten *Cantata Misericordium*
March 6, 2010; 8:00 pm

Veterans Memorial Auditorium, Providence

Hector Berlioz, Giuseppe Verdi and Benjamin Britten all wrote powerful Requiems that owe much to Mozart's, which --even in its unfinished form-- may be the most influential of all. You'll be able to hear why. Britten's *Cantata Misericordium*, while not a requiem, was composed immediately after his monumental War Requiem (1962), arguably the most significant work for chorus and orchestra by a 20th-century composer. It is a wonderfully dramatic musical treatment of the good Samaritan story by England's finest opera composer since Handel. Commissioned for the 100th anniversary of the International Red Cross and centered on themes of compassion and mercy, it is in many ways a smaller-scale appendix to the War Requiem. It is also a fitting tribute to the values of this humanitarian relief agency on which so many continue to depend to this day.

The ensemble is joined by the Rhode Island Children's Chorus for two shorter works.

Ticket prices: \$22, \$32, \$42, \$52, \$62, and \$12 for children/students.

Group discounts: save \$6 per adult ticket for groups of 6 or more (not available for \$62 mezzanine tickets). Ticket prices include the \$2 VMA facility's fee.

Order thru Providence Singers website (www.providencesingers.org) or Veterans Memorial Auditorium (VMA) box office. Directions to VMA on PS website. Download order form from PS website and mail with check to PS office to avoid handling fees that will apply to credit card orders.

Mary Paolino and Carolyn Mark will once again be performing as part of the "Until the Violence Stops: Rhode Island Festival." The goal of the festival is to bring the global issue of violence against women and girls front and center, and to make Rhode Island a safe place for women and girls.

Mary will be performing in "The Vagina Monologues," which will be held on March 6 at 1pm at the Jane Pickens Theater in Newport; tickets are \$20. The show will also be performed on March 13 at 1 pm at the Renaissance Hotel, Providence, next to the VMA. Tickets to that show are \$35, which includes a dessert buffet.

Carolyn will be performing in "Any One of Us" on Thursday, March 11. This production includes compiled writings from women in US prisons, with original works from RI female inmates. There will be a panel discussion after the performance to discuss the state of incarcerated women in Rhode Island. Proceeds will benefit Open Doors, a 501(c)3 non-profit organization whose mission is to strengthen communities by supporting the formerly incarcerated. The event will be held at 6:30pm at Brown University, Smith-Buonanno, Room 106, 95 Cushing St, Providence. Tickets are \$10.

In addition, on Tuesday, March 9, RI NOW, of which Carolyn is President, is also holding an event "I'll Show You Mine....If You Show Me Yours," an open mic night designed to give participants an opportunity to share stories about how they learned (or didn't learn) about sex and human sexuality. Proceeds from this event will go to support Healthy Kids RI, a RI NOW-initiated coalition that works to promote comprehensive sex education in Rhode Island. Tickets are \$15 at the door.
